Stop Digital ID

The push back on digital ID

Digital ID has been creeping up for years and is now approaching fast-paced. Initiated by unelected bodies such as the World Economic Forum and the United Nations and implemented by our government, digital ID will restrict people's freedom, make us more dependent on digitalisation (smartphones) and AI and restrict human behaviour. Biometric and face recognition are used for an overreaching digital ID system with the intention to control everyone—not only in the UK but globally. As usual the pretext is 'for your safety and to avoid crime'.

The current UK government has decided to make digital ID mandatory in order to work. What next? Of course, they won't stop there—unless we stop them.

Digital ID is a form of digital slavery that will keep everyone under surveillance and control, unless we resist.

Have you noticed how many cameras are watching you on roads, in shops, schools and other public buildings? So much unnecessary controlling and data grabbing is taking place without your consent. It happens with simple things such as when visiting a school or purchasing a few items in a shop: Your image connected to your payment card data is caught on the self-checkout camera; your name, face, and other data taken via the new sign-in system for schools. This is constant preparation for digital ID in a digitally controlled dystopian Britain.

Machines were originally made to be controlled by humans. Humans will soon be controlled by machines.

Remember ‘*No jab, no job*’? Now it’s ‘*No digital ID, no work*’.

These are PM Keir Starmer’s own words: ‘You will not be able to work in the United Kingdom if you do not have digital ID. It’s as simple as that.’

In the early 2000s, suggestions for ID cards were rejected by the public. Soon it may be mandatory for work and most likely for other areas of daily life, making it increasingly difficult to obtain access without a digital ID.

Did you ever agree to this constant overreach of the government in your privacy and freedom? Over 2.9 million people have signed a petition against introducing digital ID on the UK Parliament website. *Now is the time to push back* before it’s too late.

Resist! Resist! Resist! Together we will bring down digital ID.

In the following sections you will read important messages about digital ID. These are the voices of White Rose UK members and supporters—everyday people who just want to live their life in peace, free from government overreach and surveillance.

I wrote to my MP

I wrote to my MP Wera Hobhouse and this is her reply:

Thank you very much for contacting me to share your thoughts on digital ID cards.

This is an issue which raises important questions about how we balance the need for effective systems with the protection of long-standing rights and freedoms. I have looked closely at the arguments on both sides, and while I can see some po-

tential benefits, I do understand concerns about whether a mandatory digital ID system is the right approach.

The government argues that ID cards could help reduce fraud and make it harder for people to work in the hidden cash economy. It is true that this is an area where better enforcement is needed, and a more consistent way of verifying identity could provide clarity in situations where checks are already required. Supporters also suggest it might curb certain abuses in the system, though it is clear that ID cards would not be a simple solution to complex issues such as irregular migration.

However, the concerns are understandable and cannot be dismissed. For many colleagues in my own party some core liberal principles are at stake here. On certain occasions we must all demonstrate our identity, except it is currently done in a confusing way that is open to abuse. I personally welcome a system that is becoming more watertight to stop fraudsters and should cause no harm to law-abiding citizens. In fact, it should make it easier and more transparent for everybody. However, I can't see how ID cards can be linked to bank accounts without a big threat to privacy, and I would draw a red line here. There was a big outcry last year when the government suggested the DWP might get access to benefit seekers' bank accounts to stop fraud.

There is also the issue of digital exclusion. A mandatory digital ID would inevitably be more difficult for some groups to access including older people, those on low incomes, or people with disabilities, and could place further barriers in their way.

Finally, there are real questions of cost and practicality. Such a scheme could run into billions of pounds for the taxpayer, create significant new responsibilities for employers and landlords, and add further layers of bureaucracy without guaran-

teeing results. Existing rules against illegal working and poor housing practices already exist, but enforcement is often weak. Before creating an expensive new system, the Government should focus on properly resourcing the enforcement of current laws and investing in areas such as clearing the asylum backlog.

I remain unconvinced and need the full detail before I would support the government with a scheme that might be very costly and risk an untested intrusion into our civil liberties without the full benefits that are being promised.

Let me assure you that myself and my party are opposed to the introduction of digital ID cards, and will vote against any proposal.

Thank you again for writing to me on this important subject.

I do not consent

Dear Shabana Mahmood (Home Secretary, House of Commons, London),

I hereby give notice that I do not accept, consent to, nor authorize the use or assignment of any digital identification that is created, maintained, or enforced on the basis of a legal person/fictitious identity associated with me. Any attempt to substitute or reduce my living identity to a digital construct tied to such a record is done without my informed consent and is expressly rejected.

Accordingly, I demand full and complete disclosure of the following:

1. The scope and purpose of any digital identity system being proposed or enforced under your or any member of parliament's authority.
2. The exact nature of the 'identity' being confirmed (whether it is tied to a natural living man/woman, or to a legal/fictitious construct such as a government-issued record or registration).

3. The legal and contractual basis under which such digital IDs are being created and imposed.

4. The parties with access or control over digital identity confirmation processes, including any private corporations, government bodies, or international organisations.

5. The protections and remedies available to those who do not consent to such systems.

This letter serves as a formal record that I reject any attempt to bind me, as a living being, to a digital identity that derives from or is based upon a fictitious legal construct. Any attempt to do so without my express, informed, written consent will be considered a violation of my rights and may be pursued accordingly.

Please provide a full written response within 21 days of receipt of this letter.

Freedom from digital tyranny and surveillance

The technology now exists to create a dystopian 24–7 surveillance state where everyone and everything can be monitored continuously. It is therefore more important than ever to guarantee liberty and ensure that individuals continue to have the right to privacy and anonymity. The law should ensure that people can live a private life by default unless they choose otherwise. Personal information should not be held without consent. We completely oppose the implementation of mandatory Identity Cards, Digital ID or Central Bank Digital Currency (CBDC). People must remain free to go about their business privately and anonymously without continuous tracking and surveillance by the government. There must be no discrimination in access to basic goods and services if someone chooses not to have a Digital ID.

We will outlaw discrimination based on ESG (Environmental, Social and Governance criteria) or social credit scoring, whereby citizens' lawful behaviour and speech is monitored and used to restrict access to goods and services based on a person's opinions or 'carbon usage'.

Facial recognition technology is a threat to privacy and the right to remain anonymous. The state does not have the right to identify a person without their consent if they have not committed a crime. It must not be used for mass surveillance of the public. We will prohibit the use of facial recognition technology in public without consent.

AI is approaching a point where it may be soon used to monitor brain waves. It must be prohibited to use such techno-

logy without informed consent. In particular, police forces must not use predictive behaviour technology to make pre-emptive arrests.

Compulsory microchipping for humans must not be introduced. We will enact a law forbidding favourable treatment for people who are microchipped.

- Avoid setting up an account or logging in at Gov.UK One Login.
- Ditch the smartphone—use an internet-free/old mobile phone with buttons instead.
- Pay with cash instead of with a payment card or a phone.
- Use tills served by human staff, avoid self-checkout tills.
- Choose small businesses over large companies and chains.
- Where a visitor sign-in is required (schools, etc.), use pseudonyms for your name, such as 'Data Protected' and a fake email address, such as dataprotected@xxxmail.com. Keep your face away from the camera.
- Cover camera at ATM—no one asked you if you would like to be filmed.
- Be brave—challenge and inform people.
- Write to your MP and local councillors, send Freedom of Information requests to companies/institutions/organisations.

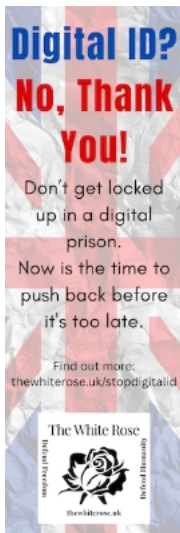
